

OUR 2023 GUILD CHALLENGE



We are looking forward to another fun Guild Challenge. The new Challenge is called, "The Paint Chip Challenge."

Your Chip Card should feature light, medium and dark shades (see example at left) as these shades must be incorporated into your quilt.

Any technique(s) may be used.

The quilt must be no larger than 40" per side, and completely finished (quilted and bound).

The Quilt Reveal will be held at the 2023 March Mixer Meeting.

A 3x5 index card with your quilt title and a brief description needs to be included when submitting your Challenge quilt.

Your Paint Chip sample must be pinned to the quilt or be attached to your index card.

Fabric guidance:

The Paint Chip Color in Light, Medium and Dark shades.

The fabrics may be patterned or solid.

Only black, white or cream colored fabrics may be used in addition to your Chip colors. You may use one, two or three of the additional colors, but no other colors can be incorporated.

Begin thinking about your quilt theme, and the technique(s) you'd like to use. Let the Paint Chips be your inspiration!

Lila Sugg Patchwork Star June 2022



Sophisticated and refined, all of 98 years young, Lila Sugg is a class act! Kathy Biggi and I met with Lila, and daughter-in-law Julia, at Lila's home, an idyllic "tree-house", perched high on a hill, showcasing Wildwood's lake in the distance. We indulged our senses in eye-popping textural "candy". At every turn we gasped in wonderment at her handmade quilts, pillows, dolls and rugs.

Younger sister Myrtle, age 96, from Sonoma is equally talented. They still get together to sew and chat. Whereas Myrtle prefers to follow the directions from a class or a magazine, Lila always adds a playful twist to her project. "I can do that, but I will change it up and do it better." Lila has, over the years, mastered myriad disciplines. We were amazed at several of her stained glass windows displaying birds and flowers. Caricature dolls with fanciful fabric costumes sat upon chairs and tables. Hand-hooked wool rugs sported bunnies and curlicues. As our eyes danced through the house, our jaws dropped. At every turn, there was something Lila had made!

In the 60's, Lila and Myrtle engaged in a serious sewing business together. Making simple household items as well as cleverly designed clothing, they traveled to Sacramento and San Francisco to ply their wares at shows and boutiques. A consignment shop carried their specialized clothing on the Sonoma Square. Lila has been sewing since she was a youngster, making her own clothes, trusting her instincts. Often when I visit, she is wearing a new tunic, elegant, perfectly fitting, sporting unique jewelry to match. Perhaps with an Asian inspired border fabric, perhaps a lively peplum, perhaps a beaded row of yo-yos. As I marvel and croon, Lila quips: "I just made this!" Her workmanship is impeccable. And I think: some of us younger gals have creaky fingers or cranky backs. . .

Soft-spoken, curious and still seeking new challenges, Lila attends quilting shows with Julia. Just last June, Lila won 2nd place in Reno's Vest Challenge! Her self-designed vest with a hand-painted King Tut likeness was a hit. Jewelry has become a passion. With the tiniest knitting needles, she has made beaded amulet necklaces, replete with a hidden pocket. Beads as well as fabric are a passion for her. Have you ever heard of fashioning chunky "turquoise" beads out of dried potatoes? She can also paint and draw on fabric. Have you heard of using crayons? Set with wax paper and an iron? Julia and husband, Edward (Lila's son), routinely travel to Quartzsite, Arizona to the gem and mineral expose. Lila says: "I spent a lot of money there!" Traveling in their 40 foot motor home gives Lila the cushiest accommodations for long and safe travel.

A Charter member of PTQG, Lila has many good memories. In 2014, she was our Featured Quilter. Dolls, clothes and quilts wowed the crowd. As Heidi Emmett and I have long been saying: "When I grow up I want to be just like Lila!" She is a real treasure for our Guild and we are proud to still enjoy her meaningful participation.

Lila employs seven different sewing machines in her basement studio. "And, I use them all!" There were threads galore including a cache of sparkly metallics for quilting. We enjoyed seeing loose woven Guatemalan choices, themed Hawaiian and Indian designed batiks, standard go-withs in muted flavors—all shelved with precision. Lila spends part of every day down here, traveling of course, via a handy Stairlift conveyance.

In parting, Kathy asked Lila what are her favorite things. Answer: "I love wool and I love to teach!" With a joyful heart, Lila's tenacity for our shared textural craft is really stunning. We are more the better for knowing her. She's one classy gal!
