## PANT GIIP GHALLENGE

The Challenge is underway, and we hope you are busy thinking about, planning, working on, or finishing your Paint Chip Challenge quilt. Only four more months until the reveal!

To participate, simply choose a paint chip in a color of your liking. Be sure there are Dark, Medium, and Light color shades featured on your Chip card, as these shades must be incorporated into your quilt.

* Any technique(s) can be used.
* The quilt must be no larger than 40" per side, and completely finished (quilted and bound).
* A 3X5 index card with your quilt title, and a brief description needs be included
* Your Paint Chip sample must be pinned onto the quilt or be attached to your index card.
* Fabric guidance: 1) The Paint Chip Color in Dark, Medium and Light shades. 2) The fabrics may be patterned or solid. 3) Other colors allowed are Black, White, or Cream. (Use one, two, or all three colors. No other colors may be incorporated.)
* The Quilt Reveal will be at the March 2023 General Guild Meeting.

## It's R ROW-by-ROW QUITH ExCHANGE

## 

Come join us for a Row-by-Row Quilt Exchange. Starting on January 13, 2023 and completed in June, 2023, this six month activity is a great way to expand your skills, try new block patterns or techniques and of course, exchange ideas with friends. This is open to all levels of quilters.
We will meet the 2nd Friday of each month at Ben Franklin from 5:30 pm to 6:30 pm. Josh, Ben Franklin's owner, has graciously agreed to let us meet in the classroom located in the back of the store, free of charge!

## HOW DOL:S IT WOBRI?

- Each participant will receive a brown bag and entry form upon signing up.
- Participants create the first row (starter row) using any theme or design desired.
- The brown bag, containing the starter row and additional fabric if desired, will be collected by the exchange facilitator at the first meeting.
- The facilitator will anonymously "exchange" your bag for another participant's bag.
- You take the bag home and add a new row (or rows) using your own fabric or fabrics provided.
Each month the process is repeated, meaning five other quilters will be add to your initial row and you will add to five other participants' Row-by-Row project too! At the end of the six months of exchanges, you receive your Row-by-Row quilt top back to complete however you wish!

Size requirements and other details will be provided at sign-ups. Guild members have participated in similar Round Robin exchanges in the past and always had a great time meeting new friends and learning new skills! Please avoid being intimidated by the idea of working on someone else's project.

Sign-ups will be at the November and December Guild meetings.
We hope to have a final "reveal" party/potluck at the end of August and present the quilts during Show and Tell at the September Guild Meeting.

## Sue Deane Paichwork Star November 2022

Bold and breathtaking! Oozing storybook charm, Sue's 1924 Nevada City home featured an abundant array of richly textured antique furniture, a tribute to her family's storied history. Family heirlooms punctuated her living room. A tall ornate grandfather clock proudly announced our 10 am meeting. A filled-to-the-brim hat rack, two comfy rockers and cozy wood-burning stove showed their importance. Two antique stained glass lamp shades announced Sue's daring ability to succeed in that craft.

Sue is very self-sufficient and has a determined can-do spirit. Most of her achievements she owes
 to her grandmother. "My grandmother could just look at something and make it!" Full of smiles and laughs, Sue began describing an impressive litany of her passionate endeavors she had shared with her grandmother since she was a small child. She was taught well. I mused: Just how many hobbies can one woman successfully have? I lost count at ten. . .

For about 34 years, Sue has been sewing quilts. They came pouring out of her closet, rolled into wrinkle-proof bundles. Most were queen-sized, some hand quilted, some double sided. The "twins" are two Dear Jane quilts constructed in a quilt-as-you-go method. Sometimes Sue uses crayons or fabric paints to enhance a block's motif. Sewn colorful hexie flowers, all in batik, were strewn upon the rug for final review. Paper pieces with a touch of fabric glue will be easily removed.

Sue's "toy room" is her dreamer's domain, a fully contained granny unit addition to her existing home. Cozy and replete with kitchen, bathroom and elevator access, she can retreat in perfect comfort. This "toy room" also houses Sue's stained glass workshop. A smaller but very complete sewing room houses a Bernina Q20 for longarm projects-even king-sized projects.

Quipping, "I usually make 'draggers'", meaning quilts for kids to drag around on the floor, adding "I'm a putz-er." She bounces from one hobby to another. Since Sue does not require much sleep and since her husband and son work and live in Bremerton,
 Washington, she has lots of time to putz. She will be joining them for the holidays. Nevada City, however, will be their permanent retirement home someday.
