### PTQG Challenge for 2026 is "Read Me - Use Me"

We love hearing from our members who are already coming up with ideas for their "Read Me - Use Me" Guild Challenge. If you haven't come up with an idea, do not worry, you still have 6 months to work on the Challenge since it isn't due until our April Quilt Show. If you didn't get a chance to pick up your Challenge Material, find us at our next General Meeting. The Challenge material is a randomly chosen magazine page and a piece of fabric that is identical for all participants. The challenge is to make a quilted project that relates to something on the magazine page, - it could be based on a word or phrase, a picture, the subject or a color theme. In addition, a recognizable piece of the provided Challenge fabric must be used on the front of the quilt.



- Any technique(s) can be used.
- Fabric: In addition to using some or all of the provided fabric, one may use anything else all colors, patterned, solid, dark, light, with embellishments, etc.
- The quilt must be no larger than 30" per side, and completely finished with a sleeve and label.
- Save the magazine page that relates to your quilt since you will submit it along with the quilt.
- The Challenge Quilt will be displayed at a special exhibit at our Quilt Show in April.
   Please keep the quilt a secret and only one entry per person.

### Inquiring Minds Want to Know.....

Shortly after I started quilting again, I joined the Guild. Along comes the July Picnic, and they have an ice breaker where we are supposed to identify our favorite technique....well, my mind went blank...what's a technique? I was only a little embarrassed, to say the least. Do you have a questions about quilting? Feel free to ask anyone in the Guild. But over the next few months I will be putting short articles in the newsletter about techniques, blocks, fabrics, color...and other facets of quilting. By the way, I think my favorite technique is paper piecing, for today.

This month is about quilting terms. What is quilting? I don't really quilt most of my large quilts, I send them out. A "quilt" is made of three layers: top, batting, and a backing. The top layer is made of small or large scraps of fabric sewn or pieced together. Quilting is the stitching that holds these three layers together.

The stitching can be done by hand or machine. Some quilts are simply 'quilted' by tying the three layers together with yarn or heavy thread. In the past, these quilts were called comforters and some shows did not allow them to be entered as 'quilts'.

Most quilts are stitched in one of three ways. The oldest way of quilting is hand quilting. The quilter assembles the quilt "sandwich" and will then baste or pin the three layers together to hold it in place. A quilting pattern may be marked with a removable marker. The quilter places the sandwich in a frame or hoop and a very short quilting needle called a "between" is used to stitch the quilting pattern.

Machine quilting has become very popular. A domestic machine can be used for "free motion quilting". A domestic machine is the one used for sewing clothes or other small projects. It can be very technologically advanced...or not. Special feet are used that allow the 'sandwich" to move more easily under the needle as the person quilting guides the quilt in the desired pattern. Two common 'feet' are the walking foot and the darning foot. The steps for preparing the quilt can be the same for the domestic machine.

There is also a Long-Arm quilting machine. These machines have a large frame where the quilt layers are attached to rollers. The sewing machine head is driven "**over**" the built sandwich. These can be manual or computerized.

Smaller, long arm quilting machines with tables enable the quilter to sit down. These machines have a larger arm opening than a normal domestic, and the table allows for an easier movement in the quilting process.

Quilting, itself, can be very simple or intricate. Some samples below. More to come next month.....



Quilting 101 is designed to help beginning quilters gain confidence and skill in the basics of quilting. We meet monthly, January through October, with the exception of April and June. The class is free to all Guild members but you bring your own supplies and equipment. Each month's session will focus on a particular block and the skills needed for its creation. We also visit other areas of quilting, such as fabric and color choice, layout, reading a pattern, and finishing techniques. My goal for each attendee will be to be to complete a small finished quilt of your own design to share at our February 2027 Guild meeting.

Looking towards next year, a number of you have asked about joining the class for 2026. I will begin accepting sign ups at our October guild meeting, as well as answer any questions you may have. If you cannot make it to the meeting, drop me an email with your contact information and I will get back to you.
