

Save the magazine page that relates to your quilt since you will submit it along with the quilt.


The Challenge Quilt will be displayed at a special exhibit at our Quilt Show in April. Please keep the quilt a secret and only one entry per person.

Community Service has been busy preparing and delivering quilts to Living Well Medical Clinic (baby size), Meals on Wheels, and IHSS.

For various members, we save wooden thread spools and long and shorter pieces of selvage with lettering and color matches on them. If anyone would like us to save something specific from our donations, please let myself or Henriette MacDonald know.

We are piecing together bigger pieces of batting for the smaller baby quilts -baby and lap size. The price of batting has increased and we are try not to waste fabric or batting. Smaller pieces of batting and fabric are cut up and used for dog beds that was donated in December each year. There is NO need to cut up fabric donations, We cut smaller pieces into 2 1/2" and larger squares to use in our quilts.

We have kits available for lap size, twin size, place mats, UFOS, pillow cases and juvenile quilts if you don't want to use your own stash..

As a reminder -- Lap/ juvenile size 38" -42" by 38" by 48" and twin size 60"-64" by 74"-80".

We do NOT need double or larger sizes. Any Christmas quilt is given to Silent Auction to sell at the Quilt Show in April.

We are always in need of long arming, especially for the twin size quilts.

We meet the first and third Thursdays, (no third in December) from 9-1 at the back of the Nevada County Historical Society Building next to Sierra Presbyterian Church at the wonky corner of Ridge Rd and Nevada City Hwy. All are welcome.

Tips from Quilters: If you have a machine with an automatic walking foot, remember to engage it before sewing.Susie

Quilting 101

Quilting 101 is designed to help beginning quilters gain confidence and skill in the basics of quilting. Inquiring Minds Want to Know.....

Last month we talked about some basic terms, all had to do with what makes a quilt a "quilt" and not just a blanket or comforter. This month we will be covering making the quilt. Quilts can be large, small, or in -between. There are traditional quilts and art quilts. Art quilts can be pictures or abstract, and they are usually more sculptural and decorative than functional.

Traditional patchwork quilts are usually made of pieced fabric, sometimes with appliquéd fabric shapes applied to the background. A whole cloth quilt will feature extensive stitching on a single fabric piece. There are also 'crazy quilts' which are made from irregular fabric pieces. As mentioned above, quilts of any kind come in varying sizes. Many quilters now make memory quilts incorporating sentimental items or photos printed on fabric.

Traditional quilts are made from blocks. A block can be a square or rectangle, or pieces of fabric sewn together to make a square or rectangle. Circles can also be used as well as curved pieces of fabric.

There are many websites that can be used as a resource for blocks. Quilters' Cache is one of them. Another is All People Quilt which offers patterns for 6" and 9" blocks. This site is sponsored by American Patchwork and Quilting.

Important hints to remember when piecing your blocks together. Cutting measurements exactly is key to having your blocks and quilt lay flat. Having the correctly sized piece of fabric is critical to having a quilt with the measurements the pattern indicates. An eighth of inch off with each block and your can have inches off your finished product.

Another critical factor is your 1/4" seam allowance. It is well worth your time to carefully cut your fabric and then sew your seams with that 1/4" seam in a straight line....so easy to veer off a little when we get distracted! Then out comes the seam ripper!

Accuracy and precision are important in constructing your blocks and ultimately your quilt. In. addition to maintaining your 1/4" seam allowance, a walking foot is helpful in feeding the layers of fabric evenly without puckering or shifting. It is also helpful to press your fabric before cutting. Saves you from having uneven cuts and shrinkage during the sewing process.

When you press seams use a lift and press motion. This technique helps to set the seam flat and avoid distorting the fabric, unlike ironing which can stretch it.

Making a test block allows you to check accuracy of your piecing and make adjustments before committing to your entire quilt.

Sharp tools are important. Replace your sewing machine needle regularly. some say with every needle project, others every 8-10 hours of sewing. Use a sharp rotary blade for precise cuts. I've sometimes waited too long and ended up with more shredding than cutting. :-(

But most importantly, TAKE YOUR TIME! Rushing any artistic endeavor and one is almost secure in the knowledge that something will need to be attacked with a seam ripper. Rushing the process can lead to mistakes and decreased accuracy, so slow down to ensure precision and mistake free sewing....

Next month we will check out blocks to make!
